4.0 ORDINARY BUSINESS

- 4.1 Chairman's report is on page 9, just table it bearing in mind I did write it on Monday just go to your points of interest as your probably aware the liberal party and Ken Wyatt were successfully being returned and we have a pledge by the Prime Minister of \$6 million dollars. Lachlan recently finished submitting and will hopefully come in within 12mths.
- 4.2 In the not too distant future the ABL is going to function again it may be different but Baseball Australia and the represented states are 100% owner of the ABL so hopefully we can make it work and continue to play.
- 4.3 Financial report is also on page 53 so that's there for your approval. No questions on financials were received.

5.0 BASEBALL WA STATE OF THE GAME PRESENTATION

Lachlan Dale presented state of the game and financial reports. No questions from members.

6.0 ELECTION OF DIRECTORS

I'd have 6 elections of director's and I'll hand over to Lachlan Dale because my 2-year period is up. So just an update on the election of directors. Two (2) board members resigned throughout the year. Michelle Palethorpe came on with a legal background and a governance background. She actually moved to the Sports Federation Board so still in sport just a different element of it. Greg Maynard who used to be a director of sport and moved to a deputy principal of a high school. Due to work and family commitments, he couldn't stay on the board.

On the 29th September the board co-opted Phil Gregson so we will ratify the board members to start off with. Also on the 19th January the board co-opted Robbie Murphy, so we looked to ratify both members as official board members or their 2 years point of contact.

Phil has held senior management roles at the WACA, Triathlon WA and Basketball WA over the past 15 years. He is employed by the Department of Sport and Recreation (DSR) and managed nine (9) regional

talent networks across WA, after previously working with over 15 state sporting association on governments planning and funding initiatives. He used to be our sports consultant at the DSR for three (3) years prior and obviously moved into a different area with DSR. Baseball WA jumped at the opportunity with his knowledge and understanding of sporting associations.

Robbie Murphy is probably new to the sport of baseball. She has over 20 years' experience in specialising in and formulating highly effective integrated governance risk management and compliant solutions for listed companies, listed entities and also not for profit organisations. Together with Phil, they have also formed the government sub committee which we will be reviewing all the policies within the next 6-12 months and setting up a structure for going forward.

I like to move that we ratify Phil Gregson, and also make the movement to ratify Robbie Murphy onto the Board of Baseball WA. Moved: Kevin House Second: Rob Goodin.

A note that we have two (2) vacant positions on the board and we had no other application and as Steve alerted to before, his two (2) year term is up. Steve has been a Director on the Board for the past eight (8) years and has been Chairman for the past six (6) years. We believe he possesses strong skills and experience in leadership, govern relationships and also media relationships. He recently retired from 30 years in the police force and his most recent ranking was as Inspector, managing a large team of people and obviously in there district. Steve's experience is critical with the success of Baseball WA. During his time on the board over the past 12 months, Steve has contributed in over seeing the acquisition of the \$1.7 million dollars of State Funding and also the pledge of the federal liberal party for the further \$6 million dollars to upgrade the Ballpark. He has also overseen what we believe is a transition of the board into a more professional sporting body. Also to look at the governance in an overall key structures and strategies of the board and obviously the organisation of the board moving forward. We'd like to move and ratify Steve's nomination to continue as a Director of Baseball WA.

Moved: Kevin House and also Rob Goodin.

Steve would like to confirm that they have been ratified for another two (2) years into the Board of Directors.

7.0 CONSTITUTION

Thank you. Moving along team something of the constitutions so probably more of an update of what it looks like its more policy addition more so of an acknowledgement of the constitution of the board and baseball WA's rights.

It's with regards to Tee ball. We've been working over the past 4 or 5 years heavily of just developing that relationship and what it means as far as baseball WA MOU as well as TBAWA we would like to amend an update that MOU which starts to include them as a partner with baseball WA so just the 4 points to add to the policy would be to recognize that TBAWA its clubs and members are affiliated to and considered members of baseball WA TBAWA clubs and members will not receive ordinary shares of baseball WA baseball WA agree that it will not manage the operations of TBAWA its clubs or members and it will not govern a sport under its constitution and that baseball WA will manage the appropriate use of all funding related to government grant agreements submitted by TBAWA clubs and associations where by baseball WA is required as a state sporting organization and required to coincide with all agreements in the line with the objective at the MOU and agreement with the TBAWA, Baseball WA and Baseball Australia.

In the broader pitcher as mentioned before it opens up voting capabilities and if you take a snapshot of the \$500 equipment grant over 50 tee ball clubs injecting \$30,000 in the plus other associated grass roots programs and extension of reach.

**PASSING OF A LEGEND:
VALE GREG JELKS**

It's with a very heavy heart we can confirm Greg Jelks has passed away on Friday, January 6th 2017 at the age of 55.

Born in Centre, Alabama on August 16th 1961, Greg's Baseball talent was evident from a young age. In 1981 the Philadelphia Phillies signed Jelks and on August 20th 1987, "Jelksy" made his MLB debut for the Phillies.

As many Baseball players do, Jelks decided to see the world and play the game he loved.

That love for the game saw Jelks sign with the Perth Heat and for both Jelks and Perth it was a match made in Heaven.

Baseball WA CEO Lachy Dale remembers Jelks fondly.

"Greg Jelks changed the game of Baseball in WA and put it on the map," Dale said.

"He was integral to the success of the Perth Heat and WA Baseball over the past 23 years and many people will still remember the days of watching the famous 44 play at Parry Field during the 90's. A true gentleman of the game, Greg will be sadly missed by the Baseball community but his legacy will forever live on."

Jelks immediately became a household name and was the Hero Baseball needed to continue

became even more legendary once number 44 joined the Heat.

Jelks wowed the large Perth crowds with his booming bat and almost effortless talent on the field. He made the game seem easy, fun and gave everyone a reason to come out to the ballpark.

The love Greg received from Perth he paid back by deciding this city was the place for him to call home.

Baseball Australia Chairman David Hynes played against Jelks, and was always impressed with his character and skill.

“I played against Greg and he was an amazing player and a true gentleman.”

“Greg was hugely influential in baseball in Australia, particularly on the West Coast, and he has left us way too soon. On behalf of everyone involved in Australian Baseball, our thoughts are with Greg’s family and friends. We have lost an amazing person today. We celebrate the great bloke that he was and the legacy that he leaves our game.”

Greg Jelks became a dual citizen and went on to represent Australia in numerous prestigious international tournaments including the 2000 Sydney Olympics.

During his time in the ABL Jelks put up numbers that remain in only the most elite of company.


Anybody who has anything to do with Baseball in this city knew and loved Greg Jelks.

CHAIRMAN



It is my pleasure to present my seventh report as Chairman of Baseball WA.

The past year has seen significant changes to the state facility at Baseball Park. Thanks to a \$1.7million grant from the State Government, we were able to replace the existing lights with digital television compliant ones, thus raising them to international standard. Additionally, we were able to construct an additional ablutions block on the left field line.

Our champion of baseball, Mr Ken Wyatt, the Federal Member for Hasluck, came through with his election wish by convincing the Turnbull Government to allocate a \$6million grant to further upgrade the ballpark. This grant will allow completion of a media centre, scorers box and a corporate suite on the top of the new ablutions block. It will also deliver new seating with increased capacity; and grassed terraces; new amenities and corporate facilities.

Mr Ryan Willis has been engaged as the Project Manager for the two years the project is estimated to take to complete. Ryan comes to us from the Department of Sport and Recreation where he has been involved with the development of the Baseball Park Facility Upgrade Project from the

beginning. A Steering Committee has been formed to guide the project. It is hoped that the majority of the work will occur off season so as to not affect the ABL and State seasons.

Work has commenced on the flyover on Nicholson Road near the ballpark. This is expected to be completed mid next year and will include a pedestrian bridge from the other side of Nicholson Road to behind the centre line of the ballpark.

The Board, in consultation with all stakeholders, has developed the Baseball WA Strategic Plan 2017 – 2020. This will guide our strategic direction over the next three years. Numerous policies and the Constitution have been reviewed and updated where required.

In March, we saw the resignation of Mr Brett Pickett as the CEO of Baseball Australia after 17 years. Brett felt it was time for him to take on new challenges and allow fresh blood to take over the role. We wish Brett all the best for the future and thank him for his leadership, guidance and the development of the sport of baseball within Australia.

Brett's replacement, Mr Cameron Vale, took office on April 1st 2017. Cameron (Cam) comes to us from being the CEO of Hockey Australia. He brings with him a wealth of knowledge and experience in various aspects of sport in Australia. We look forward to his leadership, fresh ideas and new direction within the national arena of baseball in Australia.

As a result of the amalgamation of government departments under the new Labour Government, the Department of Sport and Recreation (DSR) will join the Department of Culture and Arts, Racing and Gaming and Local Government to become the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries. It is not envisioned that this amalgamation will affect the fantastic support we receive. It will however see the retirement of Mr Ron Alexander as the Director General of the Department of Sport and Recreation after nearly two decades. Ron will be a great loss to sport and recreation within Western Australia.

The upcoming ABL season will replicate that which

took place during the 2016/17 season. Baseball Australia, the ABL and member states continue to examine new formats, funding arrangements and sponsorship options to ensure the continuance of the League in the years to come.

To the Federal and State Governments; the Department of Sport and Recreation; Healthway; and the City of Gosnells Council; I thank you for your ongoing support of baseball in Western Australia.

To the Board of Baseball Australia and staff and the staff at the Australian Baseball League, I thank you for your commitment to the development of the sport of baseball in Australia.

To the WA Scorers and Statisticians Association; the WA Baseball Umpires Association; all member

clubs and charters and their committees; and the numerous volunteers; I thank you for your efforts, dedication and commitment to the sport of baseball in Western Australia.

To Lachlan Dale and the staff at Baseball WA and the Perth Heat, I extend my sincere appreciation for your continued tireless efforts in ensuring that baseball in WA continues to be leaders in the sport of baseball in Australia, both on and off the field.

To my fellow members on the Board of Directors of Baseball WA, I thank you sincerely for your commitment to the strategic direction of baseball in Western Australia and the continued support you provide me as Chairman.

First of all, I would like to give special Thanks to the Clubs, Volunteers, Supporters and committee's within Baseball WA. Without the time, passion and dedication from you, the game we all love, would not be as successful as it is.

I would also like to thank the staff of Baseball WA, who work tirelessly on providing support and guidance to clubs and members throughout the year.

Over the past 12 months, there have been several additions to the Board of Baseball WA. I want to thank you for the guidance and dedication you have provided to ensure the organisation captures the success, plans for the future and continues the great work that is already occurring for baseball in this state. As many clubs would be aware, we will be undergoing a Strategic Plan Review which will commence this month. With a collaborative approach between, clubs, charters, members and stakeholders, we will have the blueprint for continued success and growth of Baseball in WA

Since the last Baseball WA Annual General Meeting I want to take some time to mention some of WA's key highlights.

- In April 2017, our Women won silver at the 2017 National Championships.
- Later that month, the Tiger Cubs launched in which 48 players toured to Geraldton for a week long camp. The players got to experience life outside of baseball as they learnt more about our regional towns.
- July to October saw WA again lead the way with National Team Representation
 - ** 15U WC – Japan
 - ** U23 WC – Mexico
 - ** Women's – Japan
 - ** WBC Team – also in Japan
 - ** 17 players and 4 coaches
- Recognition continued for WA's elite athletes with Ulrich Bojarski and Jake Baker both signing professional contracts with the Detroit Tigers late last year.
- At the turn of the new year, we saw the WA Under 16's take out the silver medal in a close fought grand final game against Vic Blue.
- Following that game our Under 18's team won their Grand Final against New South Wales in extra innings to bring the title back home to WA.
- Most recently, we had a chance to watch our Australian National team compete in the World Baseball Classic. I think I speak on behalf of everyone in Baseball, we couldn't be prouder of the way the players competed against the powerhouse baseball countries of Japan and Cuba. Both games going down in narrow losses however, we did have great success against a revitalized Team China in which we won 11-0. Of course our own stars shone, Luke Hughes, Tim Kennelly, Tom Bailey, Warwick Saupold and Allan DeSan Miguel, we could not be prouder of the way they represented their country, WA, and their respective clubs.
- On the back of this performance and our results at other international tournaments mentioned previously, Australia has moved up to 8th on the World Baseball and Softball Confederation rankings.

- With Baseball returning to the Tokyo Olympics in 2020 and potentially Los Angeles in 2024, Australia has a fantastic opportunity in front of itself and an exciting future for our youth players coming through our High Performance system.

It is not just on the field that we are achieving success, off the field WA has seen some ground-breaking developments as well.

- Wembley Baseball Club's relocation to a new sporting complex in which state of the art clubrooms and amenities have been built. Ongoing developments to their baseball field and training environment will continue.
- Modifications to Victoria Park/Belmont's field have seen an increase to its spectator atmosphere and also new backnets and dugouts.
- Swans districts have recently opened their building extensions which includes a new canteen and bar area, as well as function room. With future developments are scheduled to continue the great work so far.
- Ongoing development at Carine Baseball Club continue in conjunction with the local football club which will see an elaborate development of changerooms and function areas. This will be scheduled for completion in 2017.

Congratulations to each of the committees and project groups behind these developments. It is understood by all that these projects are not easy to secure and complete so a big thank you on behalf of the communities for your continual push forward in developing the best playing, training and spectator environment.

The 2016/17 Australia Baseball League season welcomed a new structure of ownership with its previous stakeholder MLB re-directing their funding into Australian talent ID and programs. With this new structure, MLB funded 24 of Australia's best 17/18 year olds to attend Spring Training in Florida to compete against Minor League Professionals and other international prospects for 2 weeks.

Again in August, MLB funded the MLBAAP held on the Gold Coast in which Australia's brightest 14-18 year olds attended camp for 6 weeks with professional instruction from former professional players and coaches.

In another new venture, MLB also funded 20 of Australia's potential US Collegiate Athletes. These players toured through colleges in the

US experiencing what life might be like in NCAA Baseball programs.

WA players and coaches featured heavily in all 3 of these MLB funded programs gaining unique experiences that were once not available

This all meant a different structure of ownership for the ABL which saw each state body take on the operations and management of its top team. This did mean that all members across the country were levied an increase of fees, for this I pass on my sincere thank you as the Perth Heat is part of the fabric of the WA sporting landscape and must be preserved.

We as an organisation and community must do more to effectively leverage the brand and success of the Perth Heat which will directly increase participation and growth of the game.

It was an indifferent year for the Perth Heat in 2016/17. Whilst some may see the last place finish as a failure, it has strategically placed WA in a position for the future with many 1st year players getting an opportunity. Over the next 2-3 years we will see the retirement of our veteran players who have carried the Heat to the last 6 of 9 National Championships. The main objective is that this elite skill and experience is passed on to our young players to ensure the winning culture and drive is continued. These same players will be WA's representatives at the Tokyo and Los Angeles Olympics in years to come.

I must congratulate Matt Kennelly and his coaching staff for their outstanding coaching, guidance and mentorship of the team this season. I will let Matt speak to this later this evening.

This leads me to the Ballpark Development. We will have an international stadium at Baseball Park with HD lighting already completed, additional amenities a month away and plans being drawn up for the remaining capital works. These will include:

- Permanent grandstand down rightfield with a group and corporate function area at the back.
- A fully developed family area with grassed terracing down left field for kids to enjoy the game in a safe and fun environment.
- Expanded changerooms on both sides
- Bar and concessions expansion at the rear of the Subaru terrace
- Broadcast facilities for national and international standards

- New forecourt for members and corporates which will also feature a walk of fame featuring life members and hall of fame inductees.
- and an improved training facility

This capital development will see Baseball Park as the number one facility in the country in which we will host international games leveraging local, state and federal government relations to assist grass root development from exposure.

As an organisation, we continue to set high expectations to grow the game in WA and with passionate people not only in this room but the wider baseball community, WA will continue to shine and be the benchmark in Australia.

MLBAAP -- Academy Class of 2017

28th July to 6 August 2017

Fifty-four promising young baseball players attended the MLB Australian Academy Program (MLBAAP) on the Gold Coast from 1st August.

Players are selected following the National Youth Championships, recommended by the state High Performance Managers and local scouts. The Academy intends to provide 70 players, ages 15-19, from Australia and Oceania countries with instructional and League experience located in relatively close proximity of their home country.

About the MLBAAP

Held at Surfers Paradise Baseball Club in Gold Coast, Australia, the MLB Australian Academy Program is a partnership between Baseball Australia and Major League Baseball, and aims to improve the quantity and quality of young baseball players coming out of the region. The Academy seeks to provide a pathway for elite players from this region to improve their skills in preparation for the rigors of professional and international baseball.

The Academy enables MLB Clubs to sign and develop young Australian and Oceania players on their home soil – allowing them to mature and minimize the impact of homesickness and cultural change when young players venture to the US for their first full season.

Since 2001 the number of Australians playing professional and collegiate baseball has increased 40 percent. In 2000, Australia counted 48 professional and 32 collegiate players; in the 2011 season there were 73 Australians active with Major League and other professional league teams including 57 Academy graduates. In 2011, Australian pitchers Josh Spence (San Diego Padres, MLBAAP 2003-2006), Shane Lindsay (Chicago White Sox, MLBAAP 2002-2003) and Liam Hendriks (Minnesota Twins, MLBAAP 2006) became the 4th, 5th and 6th MLBAAP alumni to make their major league debut. Hendricks was selected for the All-Star Futures Game in Phoenix and recently started his first MLB game with fellow academy grad and Perth Heat (Australian Baseball League) teammate Luke Hughes (MLBAAP 2002) starting behind him at second base and Lindsay in the opposing dugout.







UMPIRE ADVISER

I am pleased to present my report for the 2016-17 season. In my opinion our association has met most of the challenges we faced this year with a minimum of problems. As was the case last season, our main issue with supply of accredited umpires surrounds the junior levels of umpiring. With the ever increasing changes to the way in which junior baseball is managed, we struggled at times to provide properly accredited umpires for some grades. In particular the decision to play club championship games on Sundays, instead of Saturday afternoons, resulted in many of these critical games being covered by green shirt umpires or rookie umpires; not an ideal situation. The challenges for umpiring at junior level will continue to be addressed by the executive committee.

This leads me to the current strength of your existing executive committee, which has been working as a very successful unit for several years now, and I do not expect anything to change for the upcoming year. The whole committee has a very good working relationship with all stakeholders of our great game which is a vastly different scenario to that of some of our colleagues in the east.

I would sincerely like to acknowledge all the hard work done by Mark Richardson in his close relationship with BWA. Without his constant work and involvement, the fixtures would not be as coherent, and would not then allow him to allocate our umpires to everyone's best interest.

I am personally pleased that Chris Rapley is back to full "fitness" as he fulfils a very important role, not only as our secretary and social guru, but in his contribution to our ongoing umpire training. Our umpires at all levels could not be provided with any better insight to the vagaries of umpiring.

Lou Bonomi has remained steadfast in his role trying desperately to get sufficient umpires to cover a wide array of junior competitions, along with getting as many club people trained up as "green shirt" umpires. Lou and I will be our best to try to work a way around this ever increasing issue.

Peter Bowie is undoubtedly the best supplier of umpire clothing and equipment in Australia; no one

turns out better prepared umpires anywhere. You only need to look at some of the umpires you meet at national championships to prove my point.

Dan Morgan, despite a dramatic increase in his external professional responsibilities and personal life (will become a father again before Christmas!!), does his best to assist Lou with junior programs, particularly Little League. He also works closely with Chris on all social functions, particularly the Umpires Appreciation Night at the ballpark and organising attendees for the Little League Player of the Week awards during Perth HEAT games.



The outstanding performance of the coaching staff is again acknowledged.

Although the success on the diamond as a charter was limited this season the future is looking brighter with the likely addition of another two tee-ball clubs entering teams into Little League for the upcoming season.



Baseball Australia has announced the players and coaching staff that will represent Australia at the upcoming U18 Baseball World Cup in Thunder Bay, Canada.

Baseball Australia's Head of High Performance Glenn Williams said the coaching staff were challenged during the selection process.

"This has been one of the most difficult teams to select in recent memory, which is a credit to the hard work that the players and state based staff have put in leading into the MLBAAP," Williams said. "We have been fortunate to have had ample opportunities to see players throughout a variety of programs to gather the information needed to finalise this team."

"We feel we have a very versatile club which will have the advantage of playing eight quality lead up games in Canada prior to the World Cup. I'm excited to see how they fare throughout the entirety of the program and have no doubt they will give it everything they have."

Long-time Team Australia coaching members Steve Fish, Graeme Lloyd and Damian Shanahan will this year be joined with two men coaching an Australian team for the first time.

David Kandilas has been a long-time member of the Australian Men's National team, including two appearances at the World Baseball Classic. More recently, Kandilas was a member of the 2017 MLBAAP coaching staff, as well as beginning a Player/Game Development role for the ACT Baseball Association.

Tyler Anderson is a former Perth Heat representative that has had international experience at the 2011 Asia Series. Anderson has also spent time playing in the college system in the US, and is currently an Assistant Coach at St Louis University, in Missouri.



Anderson has been involved in a mentorship role for Australian athletes looking to play College baseball in the USA.

Australia's performances in Thunder Bay have been excellent, with a silver medal at the 2010 World Junior Baseball Championship, which included a memorable 2-1 win over Cuba in the Semi-Final.

Australia's first run of the ballgame came in the fourth, with Jamie Young's sac fly RBI opening his team's account as he scored fellow Victorian Jarryd Dale.

REVIEW: AUSTRALIA PUNCHES ABOVE AT U18 WORLD CUP

Despite a disappointing final day loss to the USA, the Australian U18 World Cup team matched it with #1 ranked teams, claimed historic victories and made themselves, their coaching staff and their country proud.

The opening round began with a tight 4-1 loss to eventual silver medallists Korea, however that loss was quickly erased as Australia went on a winning streak. Victories over Italy and Nicaragua put the team in a great position, but it wasn't until the Chinese Taipei game that the

momentum was really on the green and wattle's side.

Ky Hampton tossed the first complete game shutout in the 2017 edition of the U18 World Cup, and in turn, but his team in the box seat for qualification to the Super Round.

The final game of the opening round saw Australia come up against a tough Canadian outfit, and eventually the team came away with a loss. However calculations from the World Baseball Softball Confederation (WBSC) meant despite that loss, Australia qualify for the super round and play for a medal.

South Australian young gun Ky Hampton made a name for himself at the U18 World Cup. The 16 year old threw a complete game against one of the best teams in the world, then against the USA, he claimed what many people saw as the catch of the tournament on a line drive comeback. Ky will look to build on a solid rookie campaign for the Adelaide Bite in the Australian Baseball League in season 2017/18.

Australia's opening game of the Super Round saw them take on Japan, with the entire baseball world taking notice. An extra innings loss was heartbreaking, but the determination and desire of the entire team was to be commended. Against a team full of future Japanese all-stars who'll sign for astronomical amounts of money, the Australian team never gave in.

Jack O'Loughlin lead the team to a 3-0 victory over #5 ranked Cuba, a win which gave so many Australian



baseball fans so much pleasure after the events of the World Baseball Classic.

The team's final game of the tournament came against the USA, with the eventual world champion coming out on top, 9-0.

Despite that loss, Australia has gained many more fans for the way they play the game on an international stage, and valuable WBSC World Ranking points.

The WBSC has yet to release their updated rankings, however a significant increase in points may see Australia push past their already historic ranking of 8th.

The 'World Cup' season is over for another year, with our U15 and U23 teams vying for the Title of World Champion in 2018.



During the 3 week tour the party in a convoy of 5 vans navigated approximately 1,500 miles across the Mid-West passing through the 4 states of Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota and Iowa. The players and coaches attended baseball coaching clinics in all states including the White Sox Academy in Chicago. They experienced Major League Baseball games at the homes of the Chicago White Sox, Milwaukee Brewers and the Minnesota Twins and took an in depth tour of Wrigley Field, the home of the Chicago Cubs.

Special thanks goes out to Liam Hendriks and

the Oakland Athletics organisation for allowing unprecedented access during batting practice prior to the White Sox v Athletics game. The players gained a lot out of their interactions with Liam and the Oakland coaches. They also had the opportunity to experience a number of college and independent league games during the tour.

From a playing perspective they played approximately 15 games of baseball including a major tournament in Kenosha where one of the 15U teams finished second in that tournament. A key element of this tournament was that the WA Aces combined with American players from the Brew State Baseball Academy. This was a tremendous opportunity to not only play baseball in America against Americans, but also to play alongside them as teammates.

Another key element of the tour was the opportunity for the players to homestay, not once but twice, firstly during the Kenosha, Wisconsin stay and then during their stay in St Cloud, Minnesota. The players got the opportunity to experience life in America's heart land which was not only a great cultural experience, but also allowed life-long friendships to be form with fellow players and their families. The generosity show by all of the host families was overwhelming.



One of the highlights of the tour was the opportunity to play a 6 inning game of baseball on the legendary 'Field of Dreams'. There are very few teams that have ever, and will ever, get the opportunity to play a game of baseball on this unique field. It is difficult to describe in words what that experience felt like. Watching the players emerge from the corn fields into centre field reminiscent of the movie was magical. It was truly a once in a life time experience.

The 2016/17 Season was a rebuilding season on and off the field, with some great young prospects on the field and some new faces in the office the 2016/17 season is the foundation we will build the next decade.

Despite the team struggling to get wins on the board this season we still managed to pull the biggest crowned in the ABL, this shows the passion and loyalty fans have for the Heat. We also exceeded our ticket sales target for the season with a season attendance of 15 000.

Along with some fresh faces in the office we also had a brand new ticketing system. Tickets.com provided an improved online ticket service prompting an increase in online ticket sales and relieving pressure off the box office.

Memberships were also available online but was a difficult sell for the 2016/17 season. The uncertainty surrounding the ABL and its financial support from MLB caused some members to be concerned that there wouldn't be an ABL this season. However the biggest challenge was the drop in the number of home games and the increase in membership prices. This resulted in a 57% decrease in memberships. A two-year strategy has been formulated to increase memberships numbers to 600.

Our digital media has continued to grow this season with a 13% increase in our Facebook page likes. Our weekly news email was also introduced with over 7500 subscribers. We will be looking to increase our fan engagement with more behind the scenes videos on our Facebook page.

We have learnt a lot from the 2016/17 season and the lessons we have learnt will shape the 2017/18 season. The coming season will see an emphasis in increasing overall attendance and Full Season Memberships.

I'm excited to see what the 2017/18 season has in store, it's shaping up to be the biggest season yet and our goal is to get the team as much support as possible so they can bring the Claxton Shield home to WA.

Coaches Report

TRIALS

These commenced at the start of September, at Barbagallo Ballpark and were well represented with about 50 players attending. The ability to utilize Barbagallo Ballpark was of great help for the selections and later for team practice. The opportunity this gave the players and staff to perform at a high level was a key element in our states overall performance.

TEAM PRACTICE

Our practice sessions were held on Monday afternoons at Baseball Park in conjunction with our state 18's and was a great benefit to both our players and the staff. Players received quality instructions from all coaches and the PERTH HEAT staff and players who attended on numerous occasions. We could simulate match conditions on a regular basis, utilize the dirt bullpens and maximize the hitting cages, enabling us to run a professional and well organized practice session. This also allowed more coaches to be involved in developing and preparing both teams. The 16's also had a 2nd practice session on Saturday mornings at Baseball Park. These sessions were mainly our batting practice workouts and on occasions we would go over our team defences.

The Goodwill series was again a good warm up to the nationals and encourage BWA to continue with this series. It is great for the staff, players and team to work on things and get game time as a unit against quality opposition.

JANUARY CHAMPIONSHIPS

The championships were held at the Blacktown Baseball complex in Sydney, NSW in conjunction with the National 18's championships. Unfortunately, some days were affected by the rain and games were forced to be delayed or postponed to later. Baseball Australia may need to consider having other field options available if required at future programs.

TEAM PERFORMANCE

The team finished with an overall Win\Loss record of 8 and 3, finishing with a silver medal. We played Victoria Blue in the Gold medal game and were

outstanding but unfortunately went down 5 to 1. All players were outstanding throughout the entire tournament with players fulfilling their roles asked by the coaches. The coaches worked together very well to enable the players to perform and enjoy the experience of a national championships and representative teams. It is no surprise we continue to perform at a high standard and most times the envy of other state programs with the calibre and cohesion that our coaches perform together. Thank you to all staff on both 16's and 18's teams and especially to Carol Williams (team trainer), Rich Daly (strength and conditioning coach) for your extra contributions to the program.

ACCOMMODATION

The U16's team stayed 30 minutes from the fields, in Parramatta at the Merriton Apartments. These were self-contained apartments with 4 players per room. Players were required to prepare their own breakfast with team dinners arranged by the coaching staff at nearby restaurants. Lunch each day was prepared and supplied by a Sydney club at the field, cold meats and salad roll, piece of fruit, a juice drink and a packet of crisps. The accommodation had a 25metre pool and gym which was used for after game rehab and preparation each day. This was a great benefit to our team and enabled Carol Williams and the staff to prepare the players for the next day.

Special thank you to all the staff involved in both the 16's and 18's teams plus Lachy Dale, Luke Hughes and Andrew Kyle. The passing of Greg Jelks on the 1st day of the tournament was a great tragedy that none of us were prepared for. To have the support from all staff, players, parents and BWA staff was outstanding and very appreciated by those effected.

CLOSING

Congratulations to all players, staff, parents and anyone who was a part of the 2017 National under16's silver medal winning WA team. The continued success of WA teams at National level over the last 15 years is the envy of every state in Australian. I believe the reasons for this have been the high standard and quality of people who have been involved in all facets of the program.

Coaches Report

These National Championships will be remembered forever by anyone who was involved with this amazing group of people. I am deliberately not targeting the players as this National Championship was all about us as a state. The two and a bit weeks that we spent together this January were some of the toughest, funniest, challenging and rewarding that I have ever experienced in the game. Many people say that adversity will do one of two things: either make you stronger or knock you down. The players, coaching staff, family and friends who were with us for this journey have come through stronger and have once again represented Baseball in WA with great pride and distinction.

After receiving the tragic news of Greg Jelks death and also the passing of Don Kyle's mother on the same day at the very beginning of the tournament, there is no way to know the impact all of this would have on our team. What I do know is that there seemed to be a real focus from the players to ensure that they left no stone unturned in their pursuit of success and also to show people from across the world, how strong they were as a group and what it meant to be associated with this program.

Over the course of the Championships, there were many outstanding individual contributions from the players but in order to win the Championship you have to have it from every player and looking back, there is not one player in the group who did not

perform to at least to our expectations and in most cases, exceeded what we thought we would get.

During the Championships the team maintained a strong focus and performed at a level that would see us reach the top 4. It was our first game in this round against the number 1 seed South Australia that sent a real message to everyone. With the temperature still hovering around the 40deg mark, the team stamped themselves as serious ballplayers with a devastating 17-1 victory and followed this up against Country New South Wales (Reigning National Champions) with a 10-4 victory. Our last semi final game was an 11-4 loss against our Championship Match opponents NSW. This loss galvanised the group as they looked at each other and knew that they had so much more to give they would not let that happen again.

The Championship game should always be a showcase for a tournament and this one was no exception. Two young starting pitchers who did not let the scoring get away from their team and two teams who played their hearts out. For us, Frazer Brice was outstanding and then Connor Merton showed maturity and poise to come in and close the game out. The scenes of celebration showed exactly how much this meant to this amazing team. From the players, the coaching staff and the families and friends who were there or watching it on the live broadcast, it was the most amazing end to a Championship that will never be forgotten. I would like to think that from now on when people think about the legacy of Greg Jelks, they will include the efforts of this group as part of that.

I need at this time to recognise the efforts of the Under 16 team as well. I know first hand that they were impacted just as much as us with everything that was going on and for them to make the Championship game was an achievement that should never be underestimated. Rod Drew was a wonderful leader and the support that was shown to him by Peter Torpy, Bob Grove and Grant Johnson cannot be understated. Well done guys.

From an Under 18 team view I would like to make the following points :

- 1) Coaches. To DK, Hewy and Hoges. To have you guys on a Coaching Staff at this level is an absolute luxury. I want to personally thank you for your input and your dedication in getting this team prepared. I want you all to know that I could not have got through that time without all of you and neither could have your team. The way you stayed focussed and allowed everyone to embrace the emotional roller coaster we were all on showed a whole lot of life lessons to our players that they will never forget. Even without the wonderful result, the 2017 Under 18 team have come away better people because of you and your involvement and for this I can never thank you all enough. To share this time with you was really special.
- 2) Dea and Carol.....we finally got there. I don't know of two people who work as hard as you both during the lead up and then at the Championships. Your constant attention to detail and your ability to make sure we are prepared and all of the little things are taken care of is one of the major reasons why we have a great program. To have you both there and then seeing you introduce the players was really special and I hope you enjoyed the time as well.
- 3) Luke Hughes, Rich Daly and Johnny Ogilvie. There is no doubt that the professionalism and effort that our HP staff put into this group played a major role in our ultimate success. To have such knowledgeable, hardworking and high quality people involved in our sport is a wonderful thing. I think that the greatest honour that we can bestow on you all are that you are all "great baseball people".
- 4) Lachlan Dale. Lachlan's role can never be understated. To have him and Luke Hughes come over to Sydney and be there as supports through this time was a major factor in having the U/18s and U/16s reach the Championship Game. Lachlan made the decision to come over to Sydney and I would sincerely like to thank the

BWA Board for allowing him to do this. His support and advise before the Championships was always sought after and his rock solid decision making was never over bearing. Lachlan and Luke, thank you both so much for your support over there. We could not have got through without you both.

- 5) Matt Kennelly and the Heat Squad. Matt was always supportive of our program and was always available to lend a hand as were his players and coaches. Anytime we shared a practice with them was time that was really well used and I know our players benefited from it.
- 6) Baseball Australia, NSW Baseball and in particular Matt Sundstrom and Michael Ibbotson. A massive congratulations as well to Dawson, Jackson Riley, Alex Hall, Jess Williams, Jake Taylor and Jett Wright on making the Australian team that then stayed on and qualified for this year's World Championships.
- 8) All of the families who not only came over but who allowed us the opportunity to work with them I am sure it is a time they will never forget and they should look back on this with great pride. Being part of a National Champion team is a unique bond that they will always share with each other.
- 9) The players. There are no real words that can accurately describe the level of pride I have for all of them. We had so much fun leading up to the tournament and then to have that bond strengthened through our adversities was such an amazing thing to be a part of. They played their hearts out and were always extremely respectful of all that was going on and always concerned about how the coaching staff was travelling. They are an amazing group of young men and I have no doubt that the experience of last January means they are destined for great things in their lives. You absolutely got what you

deserved guys and thank you for allowing us as coaches to be a part of it.

10) My family. To Pen and Digs, to have you both there for this meant the world to me. Penny your support for all of the coaches was inspirational. You always made sure we were okay and nothing was ever an effort. Digby, to have you in the dugout as our Bat Boy was once again "entertaining". You did a great job and when you weren't there the team certainly noticed. Thank you both for allowing me to do this role and be a part of this organisation.



The financial statements cover Baseball WA Limited as an individual entity. Baseball WA Limited is a not for profit Association incorporated in Western Australia under the Associations Incorporation Act 1987.

It is a Company limited by shares, incorporated and domiciled in Australia.

1 Basis of Preparation

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Corporations Act 2001. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

In the opinion of the Committee of Management, the Association is not a reporting entity since there are unlikely to exist users of the financial report who are not able to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy specifically all of their information needs. These special purpose financial statements have been prepared to meet the reporting requirements of the Act.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards and Accounting Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements, AASB 107 Statement of Cash Flows, AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors and AASB 1054 Australian Additional Disclosures.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

Significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and are consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Property, Plant and Equipment

Classes of property, plant and equipment are measured using the cost model.

Assets are carried at cost less any accumulated depreciation and any impairment losses. Costs include purchase price, other directly attributable costs and the initial estimate of the costs of dismantling and restoring the asset, where applicable.

Land and buildings

Land and buildings are measured using the cost model.

Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment are measured using the cost model.

Depreciation

Plant and equipment is depreciated on a straight line basis over the assets useful life to the Association, commencing when the asset is ready for use.

Financial Instruments

Financial instruments are recognised initially using trade date accounting, i.e. on the date that the association becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

On initial recognition, all financial instruments are measured at fair value plus transaction costs (except for instruments measured at fair value through profit or loss where transaction costs are expensed as incurred).

Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. They arise principally through the provision of goods and services to customers but also incorporate other types of contractual monetary assets.

After initial recognition these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment. Any change in their value is recognised in profit or loss.

The association's trade and most other receivables fall into this category of financial instruments.

Discounting is omitted where the effect of discounting is considered immaterial.

Significant receivables are considered for impairment on an individual asset basis when they are past due at the reporting date or when objective evidence is received that a specific counterparty will default.

The amount of the impairment is the difference between the net carrying amount and the present value of the future expected cash flows associated with the impaired receivable.

For trade receivables, impairment provisions are recorded in a separate allowance account with the loss being recognised in profit or loss. When confirmation has been received that the amount is not collectable, the gross carrying value of the asset is written off against the associated impairment provision.

Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off are credited against other expenses in profit or loss.

In some circumstances, the association renegotiates repayment terms with customers which may lead to changes in the timing of the payments, the association does not necessarily consider the balance to be impaired, however assessment is made on a case-by-case basis.

Available-for-sale financial assets

Available-for-sale financial assets are non-derivative financial assets that do not qualify for inclusion in any of the other categories of financial assets. The association's available-for-sale financial assets comprise listed securities.

Purchases and sales of available-for-sale investments are recognised on settlement date.

Available-for-sale financial assets are measured at fair value, with subsequent changes in value recognised in other comprehensive income.

Gains and losses arising from financial instruments classified as available-for-sale are only recognised in profit or loss when they are sold or when the investment is impaired.

In the case of impairment or sale, any gain or loss previously recognised in equity is transferred to the profit or loss.

Losses recognised in prior period income statements resulting from the impairment of debt securities are reversed through the income statements, if the subsequent increase can be objectively related to an event occurring after the impairment loss was recognised in profit or loss.

Available-for-sale financial assets

A significant or prolonged decline in value of an available-for-sale asset below its cost is objective evidence of impairment, in this case, the cumulative loss that has been recognised in other comprehensive income is reclassified from equity to profit or loss as a reclassification adjustment. Any subsequent increase in the value of the asset is taken directly to other comprehensive income.

Impairment of Non-Financial Assets

At the end of each reporting period the association determines whether there is an evidence of an impairment indicator for non-financial assets.

Where this indicator exists and regardless for goodwill, indefinite life intangible assets and intangible assets not yet available for use, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated.

Where assets do not operate independently of other assets, the recoverable amount of the relevant cash-generating unit (CGU) is estimated.

The recoverable amount of an asset or CGU is the higher of the fair value less costs of disposal and the value in use. Value in use is the present value of the future cash flows expected to be derived from an asset or cash-generating unit.

Where the recoverable amount is less than the carrying amount, an impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss.

Reversal indicators are considered in subsequent periods for all assets which have suffered an impairment loss, except for goodwill.

Accounts Receivable and Other Receivables

Accounts receivable are recognised initially at the transaction price (i.e. cost) and are subsequently measured at cost less provision for impairment. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

At the end of each reporting period, the carrying amount of accounts receivable and other receivables are reviewed to determine whether there is any objective evidence that the amounts are not recoverable. If so, an impairment loss is recognised immediately in income and expenditure statement.

Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be wholly settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Employee benefits expected to be settled more than one year after the end of the reporting period have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits. In determining the liability, consideration is given to employee wage increases and the probability that the employee may satisfy vesting requirements. Cashflows are discounted using market yields on high quality corporate bond rates incorporating bonds rated AAA or AA by credit agencies, with terms to maturity that match the expected timing of cash flows. Changes in the measurement of the liability are recognised in profit or loss.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably, it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the association and specific criteria relating to the type of revenue as noted below, has been satisfied.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and is presented net of returns, discounts and rebates.

Rental income

Investment property revenue is recognised on a straight-line basis over the period of the lease term so as to reflect a constant periodic rate of return on the net investment.

Interest revenue

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method.

Dividend revenue

Dividends are recognised when the right to receive payment is established.

Rendering of services

Revenue in relation to rendering of services is recognised depending on whether the outcome of the services can be estimated reliably. If the outcome can be estimated reliably then the stage of completion of the services is used to determine the appropriate level of revenue to be recognised in the period. If the outcome cannot be reliably estimated then revenue is recognised to the extent of expenses recognised that are recoverable.

If the outcome cannot be reliably estimated then revenue is recognised to the extent of expenses recognised that are recoverable.

Revenue from training services is generally recognised once the training has been delivered.

Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liabilities at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association that remain unpaid.

Accounts payable are recognised at their transaction price. Accounts payable are obligations on the basis of normal credit terms.
