Introduction

The purpose of this document is to outline the preferred facility requirements for hosting a variety of Australian baseball events and provide educational resources on how to meet these standards.

The information in this document has been developed to help provide direction and guidance for associations and clubs who are planning to redevelop their facilities.

Different events require different characteristics in a facility. These characteristics vary based on a number of factors related to the specific event, including size, quality standard, number of diamonds, lighting, etc.



This document will outline the preferred facility requirements for the following event categories:

Australian Baseball League

The Australian Baseball League (ABL) is the National professional League and represents the highest standards in Australia. The ABL is governed by the ABL Facility Standards (a separate document to this one).

Baseball Australia National Events

Baseball Australia hosts several national events, across a range of age and competition levels. These events include for example National Youth Championships, Senior League Championships, Junior League Championships, Little League Championships, Women's Championships.

International Events

Australia is a potential host for international baseball club programs, tournaments, and other events. These programs, tournaments, and events often require an international standard facility.


Club Competition

This category represents all facilities fit for hosting recreational or club competitions, including both purpose-built baseball facilities and fields found in shared parks or multi-sport complexes.



Backstops

The backstop separates and protects the area directly behind home plate, and normally stretches from dugout to dugout. Measurements may vary depending on space available, location of dugouts and other factors. The purpose of the backstop is generally to prevent foul balls from leaving the playing area and provide safety to spectators.



Backstops can be made from either chain link fencing, or more preferably nets and cables. The nets and cables are preferred for State and higher levels of competition, as they offer easier viewing for spectators and playability. Professional stadiums typically use netting for spectator protection. Where circumstances dictate, a combination of netting above chain link can provide additional protection.

Before each season or before a particular event, it is important for either the grounds crew or facility manager to inspect the backstop to check for any damage or deterioration that creates a safety hazard for players, staff and spectators. If netting is used for the backstop, one aspect to check for is any broken or missing ties. If these are present, it allows the fencing to separate from its posts and rails.






Dugouts

The home and away team dugouts are built on opposite sides of each other, one inbetween Homeplate and First base, and the other in-between Third base and Homeplate.

Dugouts can be built on field level or they can be sunken below ground. Sunken dugouts are more traditional and allows for better viewing by spectators behind the dugout, however field level dugouts may provide lower cost and maintenance benefits compared to sunken dugouts.

Dugouts should be covered and have a maximum of two entrances/exits that are between 4ft to 7 ft wide. Most dugouts are built to fit at least 20 players as well as coaches, and have bench seating typically the length of the entire dugout. A bench with seatback is recommended.

Dugouts can be constructed out of chain linked or concrete, however as it is a player safety issue it is required that all dugouts have a roof or shade sail as a cover to protect players and coaches from the inclement weather, especially in hot weather climates.




Sunken Dugouts – Narrabundah Ballpark, Canberra




Field-level Dugouts – North Dalton Park, Wollongong






Standard Dugouts Built on field level

Fencing

Clubs must ensure that the fence covers the whole length of the playing field with the size and make of the fence is suitable and safe for players of all ages. Typically the fencing for the perimeter of the field of play is made up of chain link fencing. For higher levels of play such as State level competition and above, the outfield fencing is padded with 3 inch foam, which decreases the chance of injury to the player if they were to run into the fence.

It is required for some fields to have gates in the outfield fence so that the public may have access when there are no games occurring. However when there are games to be played on these fields, these gates should be closed.

In cases where the fence is made up of chain link, protective fence caps are installed onto these fences for player safety. These are made up of plastic and are attached to the top of the fence.


The preferred home run fence is 2.4m high. The preferred sideline fences are 900mm high.


Bullpen

A field generally has two bullpens consisting of two pitching rubbers and plates at regulation distance from each other.

Bullpens are either located off the field enclosed with minimum 1.8m high fencing, which is what is preferred by most clubs and staff, or on the field in foul territory.

The ground of the bullpen is typically covered with synthetic turf, with the pitching mound built on top of clay. Alternatively, you could use synthetic turf only from the back fence to the front of the Home Plate (HP) section. You would want to do this if the bullpens were on the field.

Each bullpen has a bench area that is located either along the side of the bullpen or behind the pitching mound if there is room, though it is commonly seen along the side. Though it is not mandatory, it is preferred the bench area be covered. This is for a few reasons, being it protects those sitting there from the weather conditions, and from any foul balls that may be hit in that bullpens direction.






Lighting

When planning the installation or replacement of field lighting, keep in mind that there are different levels of lighting requirements and layouts for each level of play. There are standards to which clubs should follow for lighting for baseball games to which this section details. It provides recommendations for training and several levels of competition play.


Proper illuminance (the quantity of light arriving at a surface) and light direction are critical. In flight, the baseball may be momentarily not visible from direct glare from light sources. Requirements for each field depend on the type of play – little league, junior league, senior league and professional stadiums. Floodlights are arranged to ensure overlapping beams in four directions over the infield area and from two directions over the outfield. The recommended height of the lowest floodlight is 25 metres.

Field Lighting layout




Batting Cages

Batting cages are often for trainings or to provide additional hitting practice . Some batting cages are suspended by cables, although many cages are supported with chain link or aluminum tubing. If using the latter material, the tubing should be covered with foam padding for safety. The netting on batting cages is similar to that used on portable batting cages.


Outdoor batting cages should measure 70ft – 80ft long. Any shorter models may only be useful for side-feeding or hitting off a tee, and not for batting practice at high levels of baseball.

The widths of batting cages can vary a little between different models. A standard cage can measure 14ft (4.3m) across.



The height of batting cage ceilings can also vary, with minimum height measuring 12 ft (3.66m) high.


Batting cages with netting installed are recommended. If netting is used, it should be hung on the inside of cage. The cage itself can be made of chain link fencing if vandalism is a risk at the facility. Netting should be hung at least 5 metres high inside the fencing to maximize its useful life.






Standard Batting Cages

Change Rooms


Facilities should be fitted with change rooms, and each equipped with seating, showers, and toilets for the home and away team as well as the umpires if possible.

In regards to facilities being used for Junior, Little League competition or National Youth Championships (U16), each change room should be at least 500 sq. feet, or 46.5 sq. metres. Each change room should have enough space to fit seating for at least 20-30 people. Depending on the level of play, each facility should have a minimum of 4 showers, 2 toilets and 2 wash basins.

For facilities hosting Senior, Women Championships or higher, the change rooms should be a minimum 600 sq. feet or 56 sq. metres. This additional space allows for more amenities but the minimum for these facilities can be the same as for Junior, Little League competition or national youth championships (U16). It should be noted that these facilities must be configured to house both male and female participants.

The umpires change room should be close to 200 sq. feet, or 18.6 sq. metres in total. Space should allow for minimum of 8 people, with 2 showers, 1 toilet and 1 wash basin.
