- 1. <u>Applying to U.S. universities:</u> A four-week online course especially developed for international students, regardless of which U.S. institution you want to attend.
- 2. <u>How to Apply to College:</u> A six-week online course on learning to navigate the college admission process. This course has a particular emphasis on students and families who are unfamiliar with this process and may not have access to a range of counseling support and resources.
